remarkable insights for leaders.

Passion, as a gift of being called by God, and how our lives are a quest for God in every moment. Passion, because we are not only going to serve, but we will also meet new leaders and begin new friendships. Passion that will allow us to go to bed at night and be OK even with those situations or things that were difficult.

Capacity, in the broader sense that it is not just what we learn from books, self-help groups or webinars. Capacity, in learning not only who we are, but who is the sister in front of us, those we are in collaboration with — and who may perhaps also have had a very bad day but you need to be in communion with them. Capacity is not denying that we do have to do administrative work; to admit that maybe we do not have the energy or we do not know everything, but it is about broadening that support that brings us into a sense of fullness, recognizing that sometimes we do need to risk moving out of our comfort zone.

Availability to clear our hearts for the moments we did not expect, for the sister who needs loving attention, to say yes to others and include them in our lives.

Availability, in which generosity does not turn into resentment but is a matter of free will. To read the room and be able to hear whose voices have not been included, that the tension is real but that the Spirit is alive, but maybe not in words yet.

Gemma's final words of wisdom and encouragement to us gathered for the Sweet Conversations were: "Leadership is wherever you find yourself, and it leads to a relationship with God."

She encouraged us to bring our uniqueness, with all the gifts and graces that were bestowed upon us, not only to serve others but also to build friendships and to show up every day.

The LCWR conference is a blessing and a gift to religious life and a great opportunity to greet those incredible religious leaders and say, "I want to be like them."
